Another draft with revisions which have been proposed by various City Councilors is being written. It is unknown when a final decision will be made by City Council.

KNOX COUNTY GROWTH POLICY PLAN UNDER REVISION

County Commissioners are restarting the Growth Policy Coordinating Committee as a first step to amend the 20-yr-old Growth Policy Plan and General Plan. However, Mayor Jacobs is also proposing an amendment to drastically alter and/or weaken the Policy Plan and lobby State Legislature accordingly. The decision of the Coordinating Committee could have a long and permanent impact on development in the County without consideration of traffic, environmental and community participation.
